Student Activities:

Winter After School Activities have begun. We were happy to be able to offer a wide assortment of activities, including Run Club, Ping Pong, and Volleyball. Please be sure to pick your child up at 3:50 PM.

Breakfast:

As always, breakfast is available daily. Mrs. Hickey always has several options available for pickup in the cafeteria. Breakfast and lunch are still free for all students.

Electronic Devices:

Questions have come up regarding Air Pods, Apple watches, and other similar devices. The use of electronic devices (including earbuds, Air Pods, or headphones), unless allowed by teacher/administrator for educational purposes, is not permitted during the course of the school day including during passing time or in the hallways. Electronic devices are not allowed in the restrooms. Staff members are allowed to confiscate and safeguard a student's cell phone or other device until the end of the school day. Students who do not comply with a staff member's request will face further discipline, as outlined in the code of conduct, including detentions or retrieval of a device by a parent/guardian.

Morning Drop-Off:

During the winter, we typically see an increase in the number of students being dropped off. If driving your child to school, please be sure that they arrive by 7:35. Students arriving after 7:40 will be marked late. Consequences will be issued in accordance with the student handbook for students with excessive tardies.

Student safety is always a top priority. Please exercise caution as it can be difficult to see around other vehicles. Be sure not to pass school buses or vans when their red lights are flashing, as doing so jeopardizes safety and is unlawful and subject to fines. Also, please be careful to not block buses when turning into the pick-up/drop-off area, as their visibility as they round the corner by the auditorium is poor in the best of conditions. Please do not park on the roadway beside the auditorium (between the building and the side parking lot). Doing so causes bus drivers to have to cross into the left lane. There is frequently a line of cars waiting in the oncoming traffic lane, making it difficult for buses to safely pass.

For morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up, please have students enter and exit vehicles at the curb in front of the school, not in the left-hand lane.

SCHOOL NURSE NEWS



ILLNESSES:

- Please continue to be cautious and keep sick children home. If your child is experiencing more than one symptom such as cough, sore throat, congestion, headache, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and/or fatigue, they should stay home and be seen by their pediatrician as needed.
- As always, if your child has a **fever of 100 or higher**, they need to stay home until they are fever free for 24 hours without taking any fever-reducing medicine.
- We ask that you do a home covid test as a precautionary measure, as if they test positive for covid, we are still required to have students and staff quarantine at home for 5 days following onset of symptoms or date of positive test if having no symptoms.

ABSENCES:

- Please remember to call the absence sick line (781-618-7375) or the nurse directly to report your student absent and be sure to include the reason for absence. I will be following up with phone calls home as needed regarding illnesses and absences.
- Additionally, please call the nurse directly to notify of any absences related to a COVID-19 matter.
- If your child does see their doctor for an illness, please ask for a doctor's note for their absence(s) from school so your child's absence can be marked as excused.

MANDATED SCREENINGS:

• I continue to work on completing the **grade 7** hearing, vision, and BMI screenings. It is going slowly and taking me longer than expected, but as I am working on these screenings, I will send home referral letters to parent/guardian(s) for those students who do not pass the hearing or vision screenings. If you would like the BMI results for your child, you may contact me to request that information be sent to you.

School attendance is essential for many reasons, as it plays a vital role in a student's educational achievement. Research shows that chronically absent students (missing 10% or more of the school year or just 18 days over an entire year) are less likely to read proficiently by third grade, achieve in middle school, and graduate high school. Here are some key reasons highlighting the importance of school attendance:

Academic Achievement: Regular school attendance guarantees students can participate in classroom activities, engage with teachers, and learn new concepts. Consistent attendance is directly connected to better academic performance and higher grades.

Continuous Learning: Education is often a sequential process where one concept builds upon another. Missing school repeatedly will result in gaps in a student's knowledge and understanding, making it challenging to catch up later.

Social Interaction: School is where students interact with peers, learn social skills, and develop relationships. Regular attendance allows students to build friendships and develop essential social skills for their future personal and professional lives.


